Dear MNCIT partners and community,

As we reflect on 2022, it is truly inspiring to see how the first responder communities; the police, deputies, troopers, dispatchers, social workers, fire fighters, EMT, corrections officers, and more, have risen to the challenges our communities incur.

We have had the honor of training over 967 participants in our 8-hour, 16-hour, and 40-hour trainings. Some of these folks came as “vol and told” and others came of their own volition. Either way, the resounding response from our participants has been favorable, with several commenting, “I’ve been waiting for a training like this!”

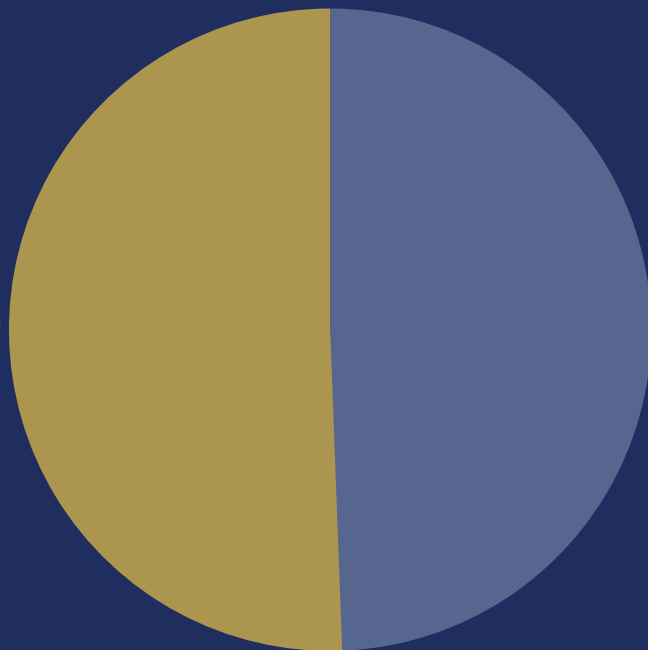

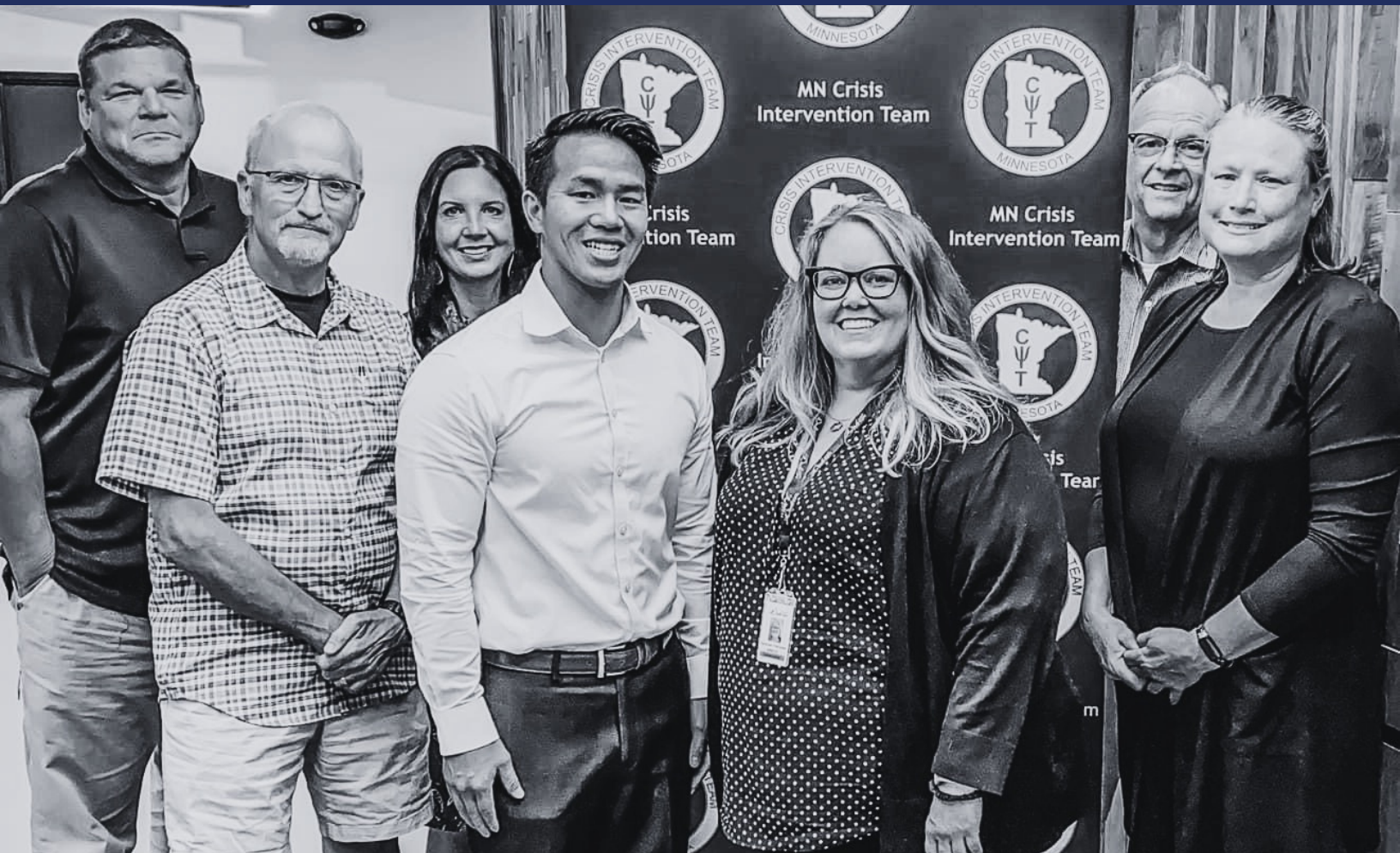
